

## Diploma

The Diploma in Arts (DipArts), Diploma in Commerce (DipCom) and Diploma in Science (DipSci) are NZQF Level 5 qualifications designed for students who have only just missed university entrance requirements.

The diplomas enable highly motivated, near-miss university entrance students to gain a qualification that allows direct progression into the second year of relevant bachelor's degree programmes: Bachelor of Arts (BA), Bachelor of Commerce (BCom) and Bachelor of Science (BSc).

Each diploma is taught over one academic year, aligned to the University calendar (two 12-week long semesters, plus exams). The diplomas follow a carefully structured programme, in a highly supportive environment with small classes and dedicated academic and pastoral care support.

The diplomas also incorporate mātauranga Māori and Pacific perspectives across all papers. This supports all students to have a sound cultural context for their continued studies in New Zealand and future employment opportunities.

The diplomas have been designed to create learning communities so that students work together with their peers during the diploma year and then move together into second year bachelor degree studies.

Courses include a mix of pre-university pathway subjects (NZQF level 5 courses) and subjects from the first year of the chosen bachelor degree (NZQF level 7 courses). Students learn alongside domestic students.

## General English (elementary to advanced)

General English classes are an effective way to improve your English skills and confidence, or to prepare for the Foundation Studies Certificate or Diplomas, if you have met the academic requirements but not the English language requirements.

- This programme includes listening, speaking, reading, writing, pronunciation, and grammar skills at five different levels - from elementary to advanced.
- All students complete a placement test, so that you are placed in the best class for your current language level.
- There are 23 hours of tuition each week for on campus students.

General English intakes and key dates

- No requirement to re-sit an IELTS test following successful completion of our English courses designed as a pathway into Otago programmes.

- Class sizes are kept small with a maximum of 18 students.

Entry requirements

There is no formal entry requirement. All students complete a placement test, so that you are placed in the best class for your current language level.

## English for Otago

The English for Otago (EFO) programme is a pathway option for students who meet the academic entry requirements but do not meet the English entry requirements for undergraduate or postgraduate study at the University of Otago.

Specifically, this 12-week programme helps prospective students who are missing 0.5 IELTS (or equivalent) to meet Otago's English language requirements for either undergraduate or postgraduate level studies.

Students with a conditional offer of place from the University of Otago for an undergraduate or postgraduate programme are eligible to study EFO. This is an intensive course requiring a high entry standard. Students are required to take an entrance test in order to entry EFO or have achieved the entry requirement level within two years of the start of the course.

Upon successful completion of EFO, students progress into their planned university programme <u>without</u> needing to re-sit IELTS or other proficiency tests.

## Course content

EFO is a 12-week full time course (23 hours per week). Assessment is continuous throughout the course.

- Reading, critical understanding and assessment of academic tests
- Listening skills and strategies needed to understand academic text and lectures
- · Paraphrasing and summarising academic texts
- Critical assessment of academic reading and listening
- Delivery of presentations
- Participation in academic debates and discussions
- Research skills including electronics research, methodology and presentation of results
- Distinguishing between academic genres/production of different academic writing
- · Structuring an argument in academic texts and essays
- · Group research skills

Accommodation

**Homestay** – English language students stay in a homestay accommodation, living with a "Kiwi" family, further immersing themselves in the language. Students are provided with their own bedroom and three meals a day, and the chance to build a relationship with a local family. The Language Centre manages all its own homestays to ensure quality and this enables us to deal with any questions or issues as soon as they arise. www.otago.ac.nz/uolcfy/accommodation

**Residential Colleges** – Foundation Studies Certificate and Diploma students stay in one of the 15 Universityowned residential colleges. The University colleges offer a safe and highly supportive environment for new-starting students preparing for and starting bachelor degree studies. This is an excellent opportunity to live and study alongside New Zealand students who have moved to Dunedin for their bachelor degree and to form friendships for life. The colleges have private rooms with shared bathroom facilities (private shower/toilet cubicles). Some rooms have ensuites available. All meals are provided along with snacks available in the day (Halal, vegetarian and other dietary options covered). Female only floors are available. The colleges offer a wonderful social programme and provide excellent pastoral care and academic support. Tutorials are offered at the colleges and group study is also encouraged to support students to keep up with studies and seek help as they need it. Following the Foundation Studies Certificate or Diploma year, students can apply to stay on in a college one further year, or may prefer to secure private accommodation and flat with other students. <u>www.otago.ac.nz/colleges</u>

**Under 18 year olds:** Students must live either in a homestay accommodation, a designated Otago residential college, with a designated caregiver or with their parents, in line with the Education (Pastoral Care of Tertiary and International Learners) Code of Practice 2021 (the Code).



# Support

**Student services** : A student ID card gives all English language, Foundation Studies or Diploma students access to University of Otago resources including the seven libraries, 24-hour computer suites, recreational facilities and gym at UniPol, Student Health, over 150 student clubs and societies and student cafes. Student discounts are offered by many Dunedin retail, food and travel providers.

**Student Support**: The Pathway and English Language Centre have a specialist student support team, providing arrival and orientation support, activities through the academic year, pastoral care support and practical study and planning advice. Students also have access to the University's course advice staff and international recruitment specialists, as they plan and apply for their degree studies. On commencement of university degree studies, international students are supported with a full university orientation.

**Visa**: All international students require a visa for the duration of their studies. With a conditional offer for subsequent Bachelor or postgraduate studies, students can apply for a pathway visa. Please check Immigration New Zealand for official and current requirements.
